


THE START OF A NEW YEAR is always an exciting time, full of renewal, hope for what is to come, and a tote full of memories and experiences to carry into the future. For AMST, 2022 marks the 50th anniversary of the Singer Building designed by Philip Johnson. 50 years on the bayfront! The AMST Staff and Board of Trustees have been planning this golden anniversary for quite some time, and we are elated to have the opportunity to honor our present, future, and past through an ambitious exhibition and education schedule. There are three areas we will concentrate on this year:

WHO ARE WE? Shortly before COVID shuttered the world, AMST embarked on an intensive review of our Permanent Collection. We have close to 2,000 objects in the AMST collection that we hold in public trust. It is our responsibility to provide a safe home for this art, to provide proper care and conservation to preserve it for future generations, to display the art for the public through exhibitions and programming, and to collect in a thoughtful and equitable manner. One of the highlights of the AMST Permanent Collection is the Dorothy Hood estate that the museum acquired in 2000. We stand as the largest holder of her paintings, drawings, and collages. To celebrate the life and work of this remarkable woman who holds a special place within the AMST Permanent Collection, we begin the year with the exhibition Texas Artists: Women of Abstraction. The exhibition will highlight the impact Hood had on abstract artists in Texas and will also allow AMST the opportunity to shine a spotlight on a sector of artists that have historically been overlooked and underrepresented.

AMST is Dorothy Hood. AMST is the only fine arts institution within a 120-mile radius. AMST is a collecting institution. AMST IS YOUR MUSEUM! Come help us kick-start the celebration!



In August of 2019 the Art Museum of South Texas (AMST) received a curatorial visit from the San Antonio Museum of Art (SAMA) Brown Foundation Curator of Modern and Contemporary Art, Suzanne Weaver. She and her colleague, Assistant Curator Lana Meador, were organizing an exhibition, Texas Women: A New History of Abstract Art. Subsequently in February of 2020, AMST Museum Director, Sara Morgan and the AMST Department Heads traveled on a field trip to San Antonio and were enthralled by exhibitions not only at SAMA, but Ruby City, Presa House, Trinity University, and Blue Star. After visiting, we made the commitment to try and get out more. It was such an exciting opportunity to visit with art professionals, artists, and institutions and we held on to the idea that we would show the abstraction exhibition, as it was

Then the pandemic hit. The traveling exhibition was determined not to continue, but SAMA generously granted AMST permission to rename the exhibition and present a new version of the continuing examination of this ongoing creative output.

This exhibition, Texas Artists: Women of Abstraction opens on February 4, presenting the abstract work of 30 painters, sculptors, collage, mixed media, and installation artists from across the state of Texas. With Dorothy Hood featured central to our examination, it is appropriate to expand what can be seen from her contemporaries working in the 40's, 50's and 60's. The contemporary artists working today bring us further into new approaches, working abstractly, with the medium coming from many different modes of art making with, in some cases, unexpected materials.

The 17 artists in the original exhibition included modern artists such as Toni LaSelle (1901-2002) and Dorothy Hood (1918 - 2000) and contemporary artists Pat Colville (b. 1931) and Sharon Englestein (b. 1965). With the new presentation, AMST reiterated the concentration on artists working abstractly; it was of interest to look to the art that was being made during Dorothy Hood's earlier years. This focus brought into the mix the works of Mary Frances Doyle (1904-2000) continuing up to the fascinating new sculptural work of contemporary sculptor Bethany Johnson (b. 1985) as one example. As a modern artist, Dorothy Hood figures prominently. Showing her paintings, collages, and drawings alongside other modern and contemporary artists allows these visual dialogues to continue. The psyche of the mind and the visual dialogue of artists working abstractly resonates on many levels with a variety of approaches in chosen media and scale in both two and three dimensions.

The Art Museum of South Texas is grateful for the generosity and prolific output of these artists and their kind and helpful galleries which include McClain Gallery, Moody Gallery, Inman Gallery, Foltz Fine Art LLC, Conduit Gallery, Barry Whistler Gallery, Holly Johnson Gallery, Erin Cluley Gallery, and Gallery 1226. We offer much appreciation to numerous collectors and very special appreciation to the San Antonio Museum of Art for permission to add to the continuing history and impact of the abstract artist's visual dialogue and to lend the wonderful work titled The Game, by Terrell James (b. 1955) from SAMA's permanent collection. This exhibition is on view through Mother's Day, May 8, 2022.



AS WE ENTER THIS CELEBRATORY YEAR for


